## homage to art deco in the heart of london

The interior is a homage, in a 21st-century rendering, to the Art Deco period. Here, in the heart of the London district, Chelsea, an SHH design team headed by René Dekker has created an oasis of opulence spread over three floors. Craftsmen from varying disciplines were drummed up to put the designers' wide-ranging ideas into effect. A relief depicting an olive tree forms an absolute masterpiece – it graces the wall behind the stainwell, occupying the full height of the building.

"Many of the design ideas stem from plants and organic forms", as Dekker explains. "They are the thread that pulls through the apartment's design." -

The grand reception lobby of the triplex, and beyond it the lobby accessing the two master bedrooms. On the right, the imposing staircase with the subtly illuminated rullef. This elive true deceration occupies the full height of the house – from lower floor to the uppermost calling. In fact, the staircase had to be shifted from its original position to accommodate the relief and now 'floats' in the space.

The console in the entrance hall is from Ecco Trading; the floor on which it stands is Gris Pulpis combined with Cioccolate Bronzine. Both flooring compenents were sourced from Maga Marble.
